Executive summary

This report provides a summary of the community and stakeholder consultation carried out by Roads and Maritime Services on proposed intersection improvements at the intersection of Bexley Road and Canterbury Road, Campsie.

The NSW government is considering the proposal as part of its \$300 million Urban Roads Pinch Point Program which aims to reduce congestion and improve travel times on Sydney's busiest corridors.

Roads and Maritime is investigating an upgrade of the intersection of Bexley Road and Canterbury Road, Campsie to reduce congestion and improve safety for road users. The proposal includes:

- Widening Bexley Road (southbound) into the grassed median and removing up to ten trees to accommodate the road widening and extended northbound right turning lane
- Improving safety at the intersection by prohibiting right turns from the one way access road onto Bexley Road and installing a no right turn sign and a stop sign
- Modifying the island garden beds immediately south of the access road to accommodate the proposal
- Reconstructing the footpath
- · Relocating street lights and utilities
- Installing new drainage
- Providing new landscaping
- Asphalting and line marking.

In October 2016 Roads and Maritime invited the community and stakeholders to provide feedback on the proposal.

We received feedback from **11** community members and **two** organisations. Generally, all submissions were in favour of the proposal.

Matters raised included removal of trees, impacts to property and traffic movements, safety, drainage and matters that were outside the scope of this proposal.

Roads and Maritime has considered the feedback and decided to continue development of the proposed upgrade and utility investigations.

We will keep the community and stakeholders updated as the proposal progresses.

1. Introduction

1.1. Background

Canterbury Road at the intersection with Bexley Road is a single carriageway with two lanes in each direction, separated by a painted BB line. Bexley Road is a single carriageway with two lanes in each direction and a dedicated right turn bay from Bexley Road onto Canterbury Road separated by a painted BB line.

Currently, there is a high volume of traffic passing through the intersection during AM and PM peak periods and insufficient eastbound right turning capacity from Bexley Road to Canterbury Road. The current proposal aims to improve intersection efficiency by extending the existing right turn lane from Bexley Road to Canterbury Road eastbound, to relieve queuing in the through lanes.

1.2. The proposal

Roads and Maritime is investigating improvements to the intersection of Bexley Road and Canterbury Road, Campsie, to reduce congestion and improve safety for road users and pedestrians.

The objectives of the proposal include:

- Improving traffic flows along Bexley Road
- Reducing congestion and improving travel times
- Improving safety.

The proposal includes:

- Widening Bexley Road (southbound) into the grassed median and removing up to ten trees to accommodate the road widening and extended northbound right turning lane
- Improving safety at the intersection by prohibiting right turns from the one way access road onto Bexley Road and installing a no right turn sign and a stop sign
- Modifying the island garden beds immediately south of the access road to accommodate the extended turning lane
- Reconstructing the footpath
- · Relocating street lights and utilities
- Installing new drainage
- Providing new landscaping
- Asphalting and line marking.

2. Consultation approach

2.1. Consultation objectives

In October 2016 we consulted with the community to:

- Seek comment, feedback, ideas, and suggestions for Roads and Maritime to consider when developing the proposal
- Build a database of interested and concerned community members who Roads and Maritime could continue to engage during the development of the proposal.

2.2. How consultation was done

Consultation for the proposal was carried out between 19 October 2016 and 2 November 2016. Community members and stakeholders were encouraged to provide their feedback and make comments via email, mail or phone contact with the project team.

3. Consultation summary

3.1. Overview

During the consultation period we received submissions from **11** people and **two** organisations on several matters. All submissions were generally in favour of the proposal.

Matters raised included tree removal, suggestions for additional improvements to the intersection, traffic movements, safety and matters that were outside the scope of this proposal.

We would like to thank everyone who took the time to review the proposal and provide feedback.

3.2 Feedback and Roads and Maritime's responses

Have your say – Proposed intersection improvements at Bexley Road and Canterbury Road, Campsie

The NSW Government is planning this project as part of its \$300 million Urban Roads Pinch Point Program, which aims to reduce congestion and improve travel times on Sydney's busiest corridors.

Roads and Maritime Services is seeking your feedback by 2 November 2016 on a proposal to extend the existing right turn lane from Bexley Road onto Canterbury Road.

Currently, a high volume of northbound road users turn right from Bexley Road onto Canterbury Road, causing the turning traffic to queue back into the Bexley Road through lanes.

Benefits would include:

- Extending the northbound right turn bay from Bexley Road to Canterbury Road to help reduce the likelihood of Bexley Road through traffic being blocked by motorists turning right onto Canterbury Road
- Reducing congestion by improving northbound traffic movements through the intersection
- Improving safety of the intersection to reduce the number of rear-end crashes and crashes involving motorists changing lanes.

The proposal includes:

- Widening Bexley Road (southbound) into the grassed median and removing up to ten trees to accommodate the road widening and extended northbound right turning lane
- Improving safety at the intersection by restricting right turns from the one way access road onto Bexley Road and installing a no right turn sign and a stop sign
- Modifying the island garden bed immediately south of the access road to accommodate the extended turning lane
- Removing the second island garden bed on Bexley Road, south of the access road and some
 of the grassed median
- Reconstructing the footpath
- Relocating street lights and utilities
- Installing new drainage
- Providing new landscaping
- Asphalting and line marking.

We have included a map to help explain the proposal.


