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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The New South Wales Roads and Traffic Authority (RTA) is currently undertaking investigations to identify an additional crossing of the Clarence River at Grafton to address short-term and long-term transport needs.

This technical paper has been prepared to define the existing non-Aboriginal heritage environment and constraints in the Grafton area that may affect the additional crossing.

Arup has been engaged by the RTA to undertake the current investigation. Biosis Research has in turn been engaged by Arup to investigate the constraints posed by non-Aboriginal heritage. This report addresses non-Aboriginal heritage within Grafton and South Grafton. The investigation considers built heritage items, potential archaeological sites, trees, the Grafton Conservation Area and the South Grafton Conservation Area.

The study has been informed by previous reports, background research, consultation of in-force and draft environmental planning instruments, the *Grafton City Community-Based Heritage Study* and two site visits. Listed heritage items are presented in table form in order to gain an understanding of their number within the Grafton area; items on registers have also been mapped to assist with visually identifying their location.

The results of this investigation illustrate the heritage values of Grafton and South Grafton, with excellent examples of dwellings, streetscapes and residential groups in addition to the civic structures such as the Grafton Rail and Road Bridge and associated viaducts.

The initial desktop component of the investigation identified a large number of heritage items on statutory registers, non-statutory lists and in the *Community-Based Heritage Study* (Gardiner 2010). Proposed heritage items identified in the *Community-Based Heritage Study* have since been adopted by Council and gazetted into the *Grafton Local Environmental Plan* 1988. The vast majority of identified items have been previously assessed as part of previous studies. The purpose of this study was not to re-assess but to identify the number and location of previously listed items.

Grafton and South Grafton are distinctive for the heritage character that they retain; this is reflected in the creation of the original conservation area, recently divided into two and expanded, and the listed heritage items. Some of these items appear on a number of registers as well as being listed individually and/or in groups. Combined, Grafton and South Grafton have over 500 individually listed heritage items, a large number of significant trees, 2 conservation areas, at least 11 archaeological sites, 14 residential groups and an urban streetscape that demonstrates the historical development of the immediate area.

As a location for an additional crossing of the Clarence River at Grafton may be identified within an area characterised by a historic street layout, buildings and plantings, mitigation of the potential impacts to the heritage values will need to be considered for this proposal. Careful consideration should be given in the future design of an additional crossing and how it fits into the heritage context of the chosen location.

The following recommendations have been formulated to guide future investigations for an additional crossing of the Clarence River at Grafton.

1. Conservation through avoidance

- 1.1 The preferred outcome is that impacts to heritage items are avoided. Heritage items are considered as: listed items, contributory items and archaeological sites.
- 1.2 Where total avoidance is not possible, preference for the location of an additional crossing should be given to areas where the relative impacts to heritage are at a minimum.
- 1.3 The identification of the preferred location of an additional crossing will require detailed historical assessment and identification of impacts to assist in understanding the cumulative impact of the proposed bridge construction as well as the management issues that may arise from those impacts (refer Recommendation 2.1).

2.0 Understanding the heritage significance of the place

2.1 Undertake further investigation that assesses potential crossing locations in terms of impacts on heritage significance at the short-listed stage of options. The assessment should consider a number of factors and be undertaken in consultation with the Heritage Branch (Office of Environment and Heritage) and the RTA. It is important to note that considerable variation exists within the items that have been assessed as possessing local significance and addressing that variation will assist with the decision making process where it is informed by heritage issues.

3.0 Further archaeological assessment

3.1 Undertake detailed assessment of heritage items and archaeological sites when a preferred location for an additional crossing is identified.

4.0 Consultation with Clarence Valley Council

4.1 A total of 76 objections were received in response to the public exhibition of the proposed heritage items. These items have been removed from the in-force heritage schedule but may be added at a later date. When assessing preferred locations for the addition crossing, consult with Clarence Valley Council to ensure that the status of potential heritage items has not changed to gazetted.

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1.0 INTRODUCTION

1.1 Purpose and scope of this report

The New South Wales Roads and Traffic Authority (RTA) is currently undertaking investigations to identify an additional crossing of the Clarence River at Grafton to address short-term and long-term transport needs.

Arup has been engaged by the RTA to undertake the current investigation. Biosis Research has in turn been engaged by Arup to investigate the constraints posed by non-Aboriginal heritage. This report considers built heritage items and conservation areas, potential archaeological sites, and trees as well as the street grid upon which Grafton and South Grafton are laid out.

1.2 Proposal background

The design for the existing bridge over the Clarence River at Grafton commenced in 1915; it comprised a moveable span railway bridge with allowance for pedestrian use. Later in 1922, vehicular traffic was incorporated into the design. The bridge was opened to traffic in 1932.

Since the early 1970s there have been various discussions and studies into an additional crossing of the Clarence River near Grafton. In 1977, the NSW Department of Main Roads (DMR, now the NSW Roads and Traffic Authority) identified that a new bridge should align along Bent Street and Fitzroy Street. It was recognised at that time that an additional river crossing proposal was not of immediate priority, but rather a long-term project.

Over the last 10 years, the RTA has carried out a number of studies to identify areas that would be suitable for an additional crossing of the Clarence River at Grafton. The most recent comprehensive RTA study was undertaken between 2003 and 2004. It consisted of a feasibility study (February 2003) followed by an environmental overview (January 2004) and a corridor evaluation workshop (April 2004). These studies identified that the most suitable location for a new crossing of the Clarence River would be near the existing Grafton Bridge. However, a preferred route was not selected at that time and it was recognised that further investigations were needed to determine a preferred route.

Funding availability for the proposal became an issue in 2005 and as a result investigations into an additional crossing of the Clarence River were placed on hold.

In 2009, in response to increasing traffic congestion in Grafton and South Grafton, and operational safety issues with the existing bridge, the RTA recommenced investigations. This consisted of a revised traffic analysis that compared previous traffic modelling with updated traffic information. This was undertaken to understand the existing transport demands and traffic patterns within Grafton and the surrounding region. The December 2009 traffic study confirmed that an additional crossing, close to the existing bridge, would cater for the traffic needs in the local area.

In February 2010 the RTA displayed four preliminary route options for community comment. These preliminary route options were developed based on traffic modelling only and were all in the vicinity of the existing bridge. This display also defined a study area for this investigation.

In December 2010 the RTA released a community update announcing a revised process for the identification and preservation of an additional crossing. The community update included the route options considered at the April 2004 corridor evaluation workshop, the four preliminary route options publically displayed in February 2010 and options suggested by the community following the February 2010 display.

Between December 2010 and April 2011, the RTA has sought further community input on where the additional crossing should be located. This included a residential telephone survey, a community postal survey, business survey and a series of community forums.

This technical paper will be used to define the existing non-Aboriginal environment and constraints in the Grafton area that may affect the additional crossing of the Clarence River at Grafton.

1.3 Proposal objectives

Project purpose

The project purpose is to identify an additional crossing of the Clarence River at Grafton to address short-term and long-term transport needs.

Project objectives

- Enhance road safety for all road users over the length of the project.
- Improve traffic efficiency between and within Grafton and South Grafton.
- Support regional and local economic development.
- Involve all stakeholders and consider their interests.
- Provide value for money.
- Minimise impact on the environment.

These objectives were published in the February 2010 display and have been subject to community feedback during the December 2010 – April 2011 consultation period.

These objectives will be used to compare the feasibility of the preliminary route options generated by the community as well as the resulting shortlist of options.

1.4 Planning approvals

It is anticipated that an additional crossing would be assessed under Part 5 of the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act* 1979; if this is the case, the RTA would be the approval authority and the *State Environmental Planning Policy (Infrastructure)* 2007 would prevail.

1.5 Aims of this investigation

The aim of this investigation is to identify constraints associated with an additional crossing of the Clarence River posed by non-Aboriginal heritage values embodied in Grafton and South Grafton. The outcome of this report will contribute to the selection of a preferred location.

1.6 Consultation

Consultation was undertaken with the RTA and Arup project team. Consultation was also undertaken with Deborah Wray at Clarence Valley Council for a previous study.

2.0 PREVIOUS STUDIES AND INVESTIGATIONS

Previous studies relevant to the current investigation were reviewed for this report. They are summarised below:

Susan Island Nature Reserve Draft Plan of Management. Report prepared by the National Parks and Wildlife Service, Part of the Department of Environment and Climate Change (NSW) April 2009.

The aim of the draft plan of management was to identify the natural and cultural heritage values of Susan Island and to develop a management strategy to protect and enhance those values.

Susan Island has been assessed as a significant place to the community, for its Aboriginal cultural values as well as its non-Aboriginal cultural values, and its natural values. It is a significant place to Aboriginal women, who have a close past and ongoing association with the island and its rainforest; a group of Aboriginal women, the Nyami Julgaa, are the recognised custodians of the place. The island has iconic value to the non-Aboriginal community for its history of recreational use. First dedicated as a reserve for public recreation in February 1870 and later in 1893 for the preservation of birds, it was a popular recreation place until the 1940s when interest in the place waned for a variety of reasons.

The draft plan of management also identifies ecological values that add to the Island's significance: it supports remnant rainforest that survived resource exploitation by European settlers (although red cedar does not survive there); it is home to 7 threatened species and; provides a rare refuge to species such as the noisy pitta, a bird that is found here at its southernmost limit. Three species of flying fox also utilise the Island as either a maternity camp or a permanent roost.

Threats to the values of Susan Island are identified and a management strategy was proposed. Management of the non-Aboriginal heritage values are described below:

Current situation

Historic values of Susan Island are largely located outside the reserve, on lands managed by the Trust. While there are no known historical sites within the reserve, the rainforest itself has heritage value as an important remnant of the early landscape of Grafton and is listed on the Register of the National Estate.

Desired outcomes

The local community are aware of the cultural values of the island.

Management response

6.3.4 Undertake or encourage appropriate cultural heritage surveys and other appropriate research to identify and record Aboriginal or historic cultural sites and values within the reserve.

6.3.5 Liaise with the Nyami Julgaa and the Trust on the interpretation of the cultural values of Susan Island.

Proposed Duplication of the Clarence River Bridge, Grafton: Statement of Heritage Impact (March 2005). Report by RTA Environmental Technology

The report addressed the proposal to construct an additional crossing in the vicinity of the existing bridge. Three options were proposed:

Option 1 crossing from Ryan Street (Gwyder Highway) in South Grafton to Victoria Street in Grafton

Option 2a was proposed directly upstream of the existing bridge. The proposal was for two lanes at the same level, or just below the road level of the existing bridge, with a one-way flow with the existing bridge also being modified to support one-way flow. This option would require the "kink" on the north side of the bridge to be modified.

Option 2b was proposed directly downstream of the existing bridge. Two lanes at the road level of the existing bridge or just above, would flow in one direction; the existing crossing would be modified to flow in one direction also. This option would require the "kink" on the north side of the bridge to be modified.

Three examples where modern crossings constructed directly adjacent to existing bridges were provided. The examples were the Nowra Bridge over the Shoalhaven River, Tom Ugly's Bridge over the Georges River at Sylvania and the Peats Ferry Bridge over the Hawkesbury. Each of the examples shows the more recent bridge being built at a similar level to the existing bridge to ensure that the realignment of the new approaches would be kept to a minimum.

The assessment and statement of heritage impact concluded that Option 2b (directly downstream of the existing bridge) was the preferred option as it would locate the proposed structure would not impact on the fabric of the existing bridge over the Clarence River at Grafton.

A Non-Indigenous Heritage Assessment for Route Selection: Proposed New Crossing of the Clarence River, Grafton (December 2003). Report by Biosis Research

In 2003, Biosis Research Pty. Ltd. was commissioned by the RTA to undertake a heritage assessment of the proposed additional crossing of the Clarence River at Grafton.

The investigation area lay between the southern end of Susan Island and the southern end of Elizabeth Island, and extended north into the township of Grafton and as far south as the Pacific Highway.

The investigation aimed to identify non-Aboriginal heritage items within the area described and to identify potential impacts to those items. It did not re-assess heritage significance, as the majority of items had been previously assessed, but reviewed the proposal against the legislative framework that protected heritage at that time. Items on non-statutory lists were also considered and a survey was undertaken in order to understand the context of the listings within the town.

Seven (7) localities were proposed by the RTA for consideration for an additional crossing and the report addressed the impact of the proposal against the heritage items in each locality.

The report concluded that the non-Aboriginal heritage of Grafton (and South Grafton) is a "significant element in the identity of the city". The localities included in the study contained numerous identified heritage properties and as a result careful management of impacts to the heritage items and areas would be required to retain the overall significance of the streetscapes.

A series of recommendations were presented relating to the requirements for further work when more information on potential impacts became available. They were:

Recommendations - General Study Area

It is recommended that:

- 1. Detailed impact assessments will need to be carried out, as appropriate on preferred crossing options.
- 2. When more defined impacts are known an assessment of maritime archaeological potential of the site be undertaken by a qualified maritime archaeologist. The consideration of maritime heritage should also include jetties wharves and other elements which may be submerged etc.
- 3. Consideration be given to the impact on heritage trees within the streetscapes.
- 4. Impact assessment of both individual items and the cultural landscape will be required within the Conservation Areas for localities 1, 2 and 3.

Recommendations - Locality 1

Impacts to the Saraton Theatre would require a permit from the NSW Heritage Council.

Recommendations – Locality 2

See general recommendations above. No additional specific recommendations have been made for this locality.

Recommendations – Locality 3

Impacts to the Grafton Railway Station would require a permit from the NSW Heritage Council.

Impacts to the Grafton Road and Rail Bridge would require a permit from the NSW Heritage Council.

Recommendations - Locality 4

If road widening were to occur in this locality the impact to the fig trees located on Breimba Street at the corner of Bacon Street would need to be considered.

Recommendations - Locality 4

See general recommendations above. No additional specific recommendations have been made for this locality.

Recommendations – Locality 5

See general recommendations above. No additional specific recommendations have been made for this locality.

Recommendations - Locality 6

Impacts to the Grafton Gaol would require a permit from the NSW Heritage Council.

Recommendations - Locality 7

See general recommendations above. No additional specific recommendations have been made for this locality.

Biosis Research December 2003

Additional Crossing of the Clarence River: Feasibility Study, February 2003. Report prepared by the RTA

The primary objective of the study was to identify feasible locations for an additional crossing of the Clarence River at Grafton. The objectives included taking community needs, traffic and the environment into consideration.

Strategic locations were investigated with a view to identifying the most suitable for an additional crossing. They were:

- Upstream of the existing bridge including Susan Island
- At the existing bridge
- Downstream of the existing bridge including Elizabeth Island
- Ulmarra
- Cowper
- Lawrence

The study determined that an additional crossing in the vicinity of the existing bridge was the most feasible, although impacts from noise, traffic and aesthetic considerations would affect the community.

3.0 METHODOLOGY

3.1 Location of the study

The area of investigation is centred on the Clarence River Bridge at Grafton in the local government area of Clarence Valley, County of Clarence, Parish of Great Marlow. It extends across the towns of Grafton and South Grafton (Figure 1) and includes the Clarence River and Susan and Elizabeth Islands. The investigation area is not delineated by a distinct boundary, so that heritage items are not excluded by an arbitrary line.

3.2 Terminology

For the purposes of this report, the following definitions apply:

Archaeological site: Includes "potential archaeological site". This category includes all known archaeological sites ("archaeological site") as well as those that have been identified only by reference to early plans, maps or photographs ("potential archaeological site"). Archaeological sites may be terrestrial (land-based) or maritime (water-based items such as the remnants of wharves). Their status as "relics", as described in the *Heritage Act 1977* has not been determined at this stage of the investigation. Some existing heritage listings, statutory and non-statutory, partly overlap with several of the archaeological sites.

Contributory item: A contributory item is an element within a heritage conservation area (usually a building but also trees and other items) which contributes to the significance and character of the conservation area. Rather than separately identify contributory buildings within the existing and proposed heritage conservation areas, the Community Based Heritage Study has generally proposed that buildings which contribute to a conservation area be listed as individual heritage items. Therefore, a contributory building in this report is a building which in the opinion of Biosis Research contributes to the character of a conservation area but which was not identified in the Community Based Heritage Study as a proposed heritage item. As Grafton and South Grafton have not been surveyed in detail, contributory items are those that were noted during the site visits and therefore the list is not comprehensive. Other contributory items may exist in area.

Existing heritage item: Interchangeable with "listed heritage item" is an item that appears on a register or list that acknowledges its cultural significance, whether that list is statutory or non-statutory. Those lists are the State Heritage Register, Local Environmental Plan heritage schedules, Heritage and Conservation Registers (s170), the National Heritage List, the Commonwealth Heritage List, the Register of the National Estate and the National Trust. They are identified by address and/or lot/DP and LEP. Items on the heritage schedule of the *Grafton LEP 1988* have not yet been assigned identifying numbers.

Proposed heritage item: pertains to the items identified in the Community Based Heritage Study (Gardiner 2010) for inclusion in the updated local environmental plan. Since the last draft of this report the heritage schedule of the Grafton Local Environmental Plan 1988 was expanded to include proposed heritage items identified in the Community Based Heritage Study (Gardiner 2010). The vast majority of proposed heritage items and the extended conservation areas were incorporated into in the current Grafton LEP 1988, the heritage schedule of which was gazetted on 10 June 2011.

State Significant/State Significance: This term has been used to describe items on the State Heritage Register as well as on the heritage schedule of the *Grafton LEP 1988*. Items that have been assessed under Part 3A of the *Heritage Act 1977* are those that have gone through the prescribed nominations process and have subsequently been listed on the State Heritage Register (SHR). Items on the SHR can only be included or removed at the direction of the Minister (currently the Department of Planning and Infrastructure). Changes to items on the SHR require approval from the Heritage Council; demolition is not permissible. The second group of "state significant" items occur on the *Grafton LEP 1988*. A listing of "State significance" on the LEP does not denote additional assessment or approval requirements for changes to the item, except in the case where the item is also listed on the SHR. All items listed as "state significant" on the *Grafton LEP 1988* are also listed on the SHR.

3.3 Background research

This report was informed by historical research focused on Grafton and South Grafton. Research was conducted online at various websites (predominantly Government Agencies), Clarence River Historical Society (Schaeffer House) and the State Library of NSW. In addition, Clarence Valley Council provided copies of data sheets for proposed heritage items identified by the Clarence Valley Council, Grafton City (former) Community-Based Heritage Study Revised February 2010 as well as verbal information and GIS data.

3.4 Methodology used to identify constraints

The methodology used to prepare this report includes a desktop study to identify heritage items and conservation areas that are listed on statutory registers. In addition, the *Community Based Heritage Study* (Gardiner 2010) was consulted for background information and to identify items proposed for statutory listing in that report.

The towns of Grafton and South Grafton were visited on two occasions for the preparation of this report. The purpose of site visits was to enable the heritage consultants to use the research facilities at Schaeffer House, to visit heritage items in the location of the river and to familiarise themselves with the character of the place.

The desktop investigation involved the following tasks:

- Conduct heritage register searches to identify any previously recorded cultural heritage sites in Grafton and South Grafton. Searches include the:
 - National Heritage List
 - o Commonwealth Heritage List
 - Register of the National Estate
 - State Heritage Register
 - Heritage Schedules of the North Coast Regional Environmental Plan, Grafton Local Environmental Plan (1988) and the Clarence Valley Draft Local Environmental Plan (2010)
 - National Trust register
 - o Australian National Shipwrecks Database
 - NSW Fire Brigade Annual Report 2008 (Heritage Assets List)
 - State Heritage Inventory to identify items on the s.170 Register
- Prepare an outline of Grafton's history
- Graphically represent all heritage items within and in the vicinity of Grafton and South Grafton.

3.5 Limitations of the methodology used

The level of investigation undertaken for this report included documentary research to characterise the Grafton and South Grafton area. One of the main documents consulted is the *Community Based Heritage* Study prepared by Jane Gardiner for Clarence Valley Council (2010). The heritage study is a comprehensive study; however as highlighted by the document's author, Grafton has a wealth of European heritage and some items and information may have been missed (Gardiner 2010: 8). Site-specific research was not undertaken except where early plans and documents made mention. Limited field information was gathered as the site visits were targeted areas closest to the river and the CBD areas. Therefore, the dominant limitation of the report is that the outcomes are general in nature and will be used to guide more detailed investigation in the future.

3.6 Heritage status

3.6.1 Introduction

Existing environment and constraints have been derived from an understanding of the development of Grafton and South Grafton. They are expressed in the acknowledgement of the place's heritage and the community's interest in the location of an additional crossing. They can be predicted (in the case of archaeological sites) or identified through research to understand the past processes and land-use. Grafton and South Grafton contain a large number of proposed heritage items in addition to the existing, formally listed heritage items and the potential for relics (archaeological sites of local and State significance).

Statutory protection of heritage items in NSW is predominantly through the state planning framework, but can also be directed by Commonwealth legislation.

The following section presents the results of the heritage register searches. An historical summary has been provided in Section 4.0.

The items listed in this section may be included on registers that provide statutory protection and/or registers that are community-based without statutory protection. A brief description of each register and its statutory status is included in the results of the searches below.

In Australia, the planning framework works on three separate levels: national, state and local. Legislation that manages changes to the environment also includes provisions for managing the cultural environment and identifies items or places that have been acknowledged as possessing significance to the community at a national, state or local level. In addition to statutory protection, non-government organisations provide community acknowledgement for a place or item's significance. One such body that is relevant to Grafton and South Grafton is the National Trust.

The following subsections are the results of heritage register searches for Grafton and South Grafton. Items on these registers are predominantly of non-Aboriginal significance, but occasionally Aboriginal (or indigenous) items are also included. Registered Aboriginal sites are included in the Preliminary Route Options Report - Technical Paper: Aboriginal Heritage (Biosis Research 2011)".

3.6.2 National Heritage List

Two mechanisms for the protection of heritage places exist under the *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation* Act 1999 (EPBC Act) Amendments (No 88, 2003); the National Heritage List and; the Commonwealth Heritage List. The *EPBC Act* is administered by the Department of Sustainability, Environment, Water, Population and Communities (SEWPAC). SEWPAC was formerly the Department of the Environment, Water, Heritage and the Arts (DEWHA) and is a Commonwealth Act.

The National Heritage List provides protection to places of cultural significance to the nation of Australia.

The National Heritage List does not list any items in **Grafton** or **South Grafton**

3.6.3 Commonwealth Heritage List

The Commonwealth Heritage List (CHL) comprises natural, Aboriginal and historical heritage places owned and controlled by the Commonwealth and therefore mostly include places associated with defence, communications, customs and other government activities. Nominations to these two lists are assessed by the Australian Heritage Council.

The Commonwealth Heritage List includes 1 place in Grafton

Grafton Post Office (Indicative Place – that is, identified as significant but not formally included on the CHL)

The Commonwealth Heritage List does not list any items in South Grafton

3.6.4 Australian National Shipwrecks Database

The Australian National Shipwrecks Database is an inventory of all known shipwrecks in Australian waters. The database is administered by SEWPAC under the *Historic Shipwrecks Act 1976*. The Act protects all known and yet to be discovered shipwrecks and associated relics older than 75 years and found in Commonwealth waters from the low water mark to 3 nautical miles offshore. In NSW, the Heritage Branch has delegated authority to protect shipwrecks in state waters.

The Australian National Shipwrecks Database lists the following items in **Grafton** and **South Grafton**:

3.6.5 Register of the National Estate

The Register of the National Estate is a list of places identified as having national estate values. The list is now static, having been superseded by the National and Commonwealth Heritage Lists. There are no management constraints associated with listing on the Register of the National Estate unless the listed place is owned by a commonwealth agency.

3.6.6 State Heritage Register

The State Heritage Register (SHR), managed by the Heritage Branch, Department of Planning, contains items that are of State Significance to New South Wales. Items that appear on the State Heritage Register have undergone a rigorous assessment process and are protected by the *Heritage Act 1977*. Changes made to State Heritage Register listed items can only be made with approval from the Heritage Council; demolition is not permitted except in certain circumstances.

3.6.7 s.170 (Heritage & Conservation Register)

The Heritage Act 1977 requires that culturally significant items or places managed or owned by Government agencies be listed on departmental Heritage and Conservation Registers under Section 170. Information in these registers has been prepared according to NSW Heritage Branch guidelines and should correspond with information in the State Heritage Inventory.

The buildings within the railway precinct were formerly listed under the State Rail Authority's s.170 Register. At last draft, the register was being reviewed and separate registers are being adopted by Railcorp and the Australian Rail Track Corporation (ARTC). The Railcorp s.170 Register had been finalised; however the ARTC register was under review. The State Heritage

Inventory was searched again on 29 June 2011 and it appears to be updated; however, the South Grafton Turntable, situated adjacent to the branch line and silos north of the railway station, does not appear on the on-line register. It is unclear if this omission is due to the update being incomplete or if the turntable is listed in the precinct group (above).

3.6.8 State Heritage Inventory

The Heritage Branch, part of the Department of Planning, maintains registers of heritage and archaeological items that have been identified as being of state or local significance to New South Wales.

The State Heritage Inventory is not a statutory register but a list of items that are included on other statutory registers such as the State Heritage Register, local environmental plans, regional environmental plans and state government agency Section 170 registers. The majority of items listed on the statutory registers consulted for this report, also appear on the State Heritage Inventory; a full list of items on the State Heritage Inventory has not been reproduced here. The State Heritage Inventory is a valuable source of information for items on registers that may not be easily accessible, as in general, the information has been transferred to the State Heritage Inventory data sheet. Inventory records have not been reproduced in this report as all items on the State Heritage Inventory will also be on other statutory registers. Where an item is listed under legislation, its non-statutory listings, such as classification by the National Trust, may also be included.

If an item or place does not appear on the State Heritage Inventory this may not mean that the item or place does not possess heritage or archaeological significance; many items have not been assessed to determine their heritage significance, and not all statutory listings have been entered into the State Heritage Inventory. The State Heritage Inventory is maintained by the Heritage Branch, Department of Planning.

3.6.9 Relics Provisions (Non-Aboriginal archaeology)

Approval must be obtained from the Heritage Council of New South Wales when making changes to a heritage place listed on the State Heritage Register (Section 60 Permit), or when excavating any land in NSW where there is a possibility that archaeological relics of local or state significance may be disturbed (Section 140 Permit).

The NSW Heritage Act 1977 currently affords statutory protection to relics of local or state significance that form part of archaeological deposits. Sections 139–145 of the Act prevent the excavation of a relic, except in accordance with a gazetted exception or an excavation permit issued by the Heritage Council of NSW. This protection is extended to potential relics, that is, unconfirmed but probably existing archaeological sites. Consultation and discussion with the Heritage Branch should begin well before lodging an application for a permit to disturb or destroy a historical archaeological site.

A number of archaeological sites (AS) and potential archaeological sites (PAS) have been identified through background research and during previous site visits. The identification system (eg AS01) was created to identify each site for this report.

A number of sites that may contain archaeological resources were identified through background research as well as previous visits to Grafton and South Grafton. Their status as relics is yet to be determined and detailed research will be required to clarify the impact, if any, and appropriate mitigation strategies should this be the case. Archaeological sites that are assessed to contain relics are protected by the Heritage Act 1977 (NSW).

It is important to note that this is not an exhaustive list as more focused research may reveal the potential for, as yet, unidentified relics to exist in Grafton and South Grafton.

Location of potential relics in Grafton (not a comprehensive list):

- Former wharf sites on the banks of the Clarence River (PAS02)
- Grafton Punt; wrecked 1943 (listed on the Australian National Shipwrecks Database ID no. 787) (Unknown location)

- Rail ferry wharf includes timber piles in Alipou Creek and wharf remnants on bank (AS02); South Grafton

- Site of Wilson's store (PAS01); South Grafton
- Site of the Stock Reserve (PAS03)

3.6.10 Environmental Planning and Assessment Act Registers

The *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act* 1979 (EP&A) includes provisions for local government authorities to consider environmental impacts in land-use planning and decision making. Such impacts are generally considered in relation to the planning provisions contained in a local environment plan or state environmental planning policy.

REGIONAL ENVIRONMENTAL PLANS / STATE ENVIRONMENTAL PLANNING POLICIES

Under the *EP&A Act 1979*, state environmental planning policies have been developed to address issues that affect the people and places of New South Wales. Regional environmental plans are gradually being replaced by state environmental planning policies or local environmental plans. At present however, the *North Coast Regional Environmental Plan* (REP) still applies to the Clarence Valley. The regional environmental plan contains three schedules listing: heritage conservation areas (Schedule 1); heritage items of state and regional significance (Schedule 2); and heritage items of regional significance (Schedule 3).

NORTH COAST REGIONAL ENVIRONMENTAL PLAN [1988-51]

LOCAL ENVIRONMENTAL PLANS

Each local government authority is required to create and maintain a local environmental plan that includes Aboriginal and historic heritage items. Local Councils identify items that are of significance within their local government area, and these items are listed on heritage schedules in the local LEP and are protected under the *EP&A Act 1979* and *Heritage Act 1977*.

The *Grafton Local Environmental Plan 1988* currently applies to Grafton and South Grafton; *Schedule 1* lists items of environmental heritage. Council has prepared a consolidating Draft local environmental plan to the Department of Planning Standard LEP template (*Clarence Valley Draft LEP 2010*), which will be adopted as the planning instrument in the future. *Schedule 5 of t*he Draft LEP lists items of environmental heritage.

Clarence Valley Council was formed in 2004 by amalgamating the Grafton LGA with five others in the region. The heritage schedule of the Draft LEP lists all heritage items from the six former council areas into the one. It does not include any new items (CVC Fact Sheet 11: Heritage Controls February 2010).

Schedule 1 (Environmental Heritage) of the *Grafton LEP 1988* was recently updated and gazetted. In total, 569 heritage items and 2 conservation areas, expanded from the original comprise this schedule. The entire schedule has not been reproduced in the body of the report but is included in Appendix 1.

GRAFTON LOCAL ENVIRONMENTAL PLAN 1988

Schedule 1 (environmental heritage) in Grafton:

- 470 listed items as either individual or group listings. Items that are identified of "state significance" are those that are also listed on the State Heritage Register. Note that avenues of trees are protected under this listing although they are not listed individually (refer to discussion in Section 5.4.1). Avenues of trees have been mapped on Figures 15; they are identified by number on the mapping:

 - 2. Avenue of figs on Breimba Street
 - 3. King George V jubilee plantings on Pound Street between the river and Clarence Street
 - 4. Queen Elizabeth II coronation memorial avenue on Clarence Street between Bacon and Pound Street
 - 5. Jacaranda Festival founders memorial on Queen Street between Oliver Street and Fry Street
 - 6. Plantings by the Cathedral group on Victoria Street
 - 7. "Jacaranda Avenue" otherwise known as Pound Street
- Of the 470 listed items all SHR listings have been captured and identified as "state" and 2 additional heritage items not on the SHR are identified as "state" significant; they are:
 - Victorian Cottage, Duke Street Grafton
 - Georgian Cottage, Duke Street Grafton
- Grafton Conservation Area the area proposed in the Community Based Heritage Study but with the excision of 108 Hoof Street Grafton.

Schedule 1 (environmental heritage) in South Grafton:

• 98 listed items as either individual or group listings. The listing includes "Street trees—*Brachychiton*, *Ficus* or Jacaranda trees over 3 metres in height" on "all road reserves throughout Grafton". Three items located at Swan Creek are included in this number as the location is adjacent to Elizabeth Island and in close proximity to South Grafton.

The street trees identified in the *Community Based Heritage Study* (2010) in South Grafton are mapped on Figure 16. The row is identified as:

- 1. Avenue of trees on Skinner Street between Ryan Street (Gwydir Highway) and Spring Street
- South Grafton Conservation Area the area proposed in the Community Based Heritage Study.

Schedule 1 of the Grafton Local Environmental Plan 1988 is included in Appendix 1 for reference.

CLARENCE VALLEY DRAFT LOCAL ENVIRONMENTAL PLAN 2010

Schedule 5 of the Draft LEP 2010 comprises items listed on Schedule 1 of the *Grafton LEP 1988* and the North Coast REP. Two major differences exist between the two documents:

- The Draft LEP 2010 includes LEP numbers and SHI numbers to identify items
- The Heritage Conservation Area identified in the LEP 2008 and the REP has been divided into Grafton and South Grafton.

Schedule 5 has not been reproduced in this report as it is a repetition of the lists above.

3.7 Planning Documents

3.7.1 Community Based Heritage Study

A community based heritage study for Grafton City was completed in 2010 (Clarence Valley Council, Grafton City (former) Community-Based Heritage Study Revised February 2010 prepared by Jane Gardiner on behalf of Clarence Valley Council and the Heritage Council – referred to in this report as Gardiner 2010 or as Community Based Heritage Study). The study area is the former Grafton Local Government Area (Appendix 4). The Study recommends amendments to existing listings as well as the listing of additional heritage items. It also recommends enlarging the boundaries of the existing Grafton Conservation Area (North Coast Regional Environmental Plan: Schedule 1) separating it into two conservation areas for Grafton and South Grafton.

The recommendations of the heritage study formed the basis for any future review by Clarence Valley Council of its LEP heritage listings and the vast majority of them were adopted at the Ordinary Meeting of Clarence Valley Council 16 November 2010. The items recommended for inclusion on the LEP were gazetted on 30 June 2011 and now form Schedule 1 of the *Grafton LEP 1988*. The significance of each proposed item was assessed as part of the heritage study and should therefore be taken into account in considering impacts of any future development.

COMMUNITY-BASED HERITAGE STUDY

The Community Based Heritage Study recommends items for listing individually and/or in groups and has identified:

- 289 new individual items
- 64 groups of items
- 2 conservation areas (as described in this section, above)

The proposed heritage items have not been included in the body of this report due to the size of the list. A copy of the list has been included in Appendix 2

In total, 569 heritage items and 2 conservation areas are listed on the *Grafton LEP 1988*. With the exception of the "Grafton punt", which is identified on the Australian National Shipwreck Database, all items listed on other registers are also listed on the heritage schedule of the *Grafton LEP 1988*. However, only 72 items listed on the heritage schedule of the *Grafton LEP 1988* are listed on other registers; refer to Table 1 for summary totals. Note due to the nature of the listing record for trees they are only counted once on each side of the Clarence, although there are many individuals throughout the locations. A spread sheet with all items listed on more that one register is included in Appendix 5

Out of 580 letters sent by Council to individual property owners, 18 positive responses, 63 objections and 20 neutral responses were received. 1,520 letters regarding the expansion of the conservation area were sent to the Grafton and South Grafton community; 12 responses were supportive and 13 responses were objections (Clarence Valley Minutes.16.11.2010: 80).

The objections from property owners resulted in a number of properties being excluded from the gazetted items to allow further consultation with owners (Clarence Valley Minutes.16.11.2010: 78).

3.9 Mapping

The maps prepared for this investigation have been created using data provided by Arup and Clarence Valley Council. Items listed solely on the National Trust were included in the mapping by creating manual lists from cadastral data obtained from SixViewer (Land and Property Information). A review of all the registers suggests that most of the heritage items on the non-statutory registers are also listed on statutory registers.


Note that the Draft CVC LEP Heritage Schedule 2010 is not included in the mapping as it is a combination of the *Grafton Local Environmental Plan 1988* (prior to the recent gazettal) and the *North Coast Regional Environmental Plan*.

It should be noted that GIS data may not be entirely accurate as a result of the data set provided by Council; a recommendation to correct street numbering and data issues was raised at Council's Ordinary Meeting of November 2010 (Clarence Valley Council Minutes November 2010: 77). It is expected that corrections will be minor and will be rectified with more detailed assessment.






































4.0 HISTORICAL CONTEXT

4.1 Environmental Background

The following description of the environmental background to the region provides context to the factors that influenced the development of the area. Environmental conditions can influence the type of uses as well as affect the processes by which sites are preserved. The environmental values of an area can also contribute to the cultural significance and attachments people have to a place. The following is a brief summary of the relevant environmental factors in the region.

4.1.1 Flora and Fauna

All early historical accounts of the Clarence support an understanding that the current vegetation patterns do not reflect precontact vegetation types. While the margins of the Clarence are now largely cleared urban or agricultural lands, cedar getters were some of the earliest non-Aboriginal people along the Clarence River. An early account by Captain James Butcher noted that the banks of the river were 'thickly covered with timber' (Stubbs 2007: 9). The alluvial plains were thick with brush when an influx of settlers arrived following the passing of the *Lands Act* in 1861 (Sabine 1970:1: 8). The density of brush was synonymous with soil fertility, and essentially ensured that such areas were the first selected and cleared to allow the commencement of agriculture. Historical records of the vegetation present along the Clarence River before European settlement indicate riparian vegetation and open woodlands existed within 1 km of the riverbank (Sabine 1970).

The Mitchell Landscapes of NSW (DECCW 2003) outlines a list of dominant flora species expected to have occurred on the Clarence-Richmond Alluvial floodplains - inferring that the now extensively cleared valley floor was likely to have supported forests of cabbage gum (Eucalyptus amplifolia), forest red gum (Eucalyptus tereticornis), broad-leaved apple (Angophora subvelutina), river oak (Casuarina cunninghamiana), silky oak (Grevillea robusta), rough-barked apple (Angophora floribunda), native teak (Flindersia australis), coastal grey box (Eucalyptus bosistoana), pink bloodwood (Corymbia intermedia), spotted gum (Corymbia maculata), grey ironbark (Eucalyptus paniculata), broad-leaved paperbark (Melaleuca quinquenervia), blackwood (Acacia melanoxylon) and black she-oak (Casuarina litoralis).

4.1.2 Climate

In general terms the climate in the Grafton region has two major seasonal influences. The first is the sub tropical high-pressure belt which occurs in winter and spring and the second is the monsoonal cyclones and trade winds of summer and autumn. Bureau of Meteorology weather station records (Stations 058077 & 058024) show that more rainfall is experienced during the summer and autumn months.


4.1.3 Hydrology

The Clarence River catchment, covering an area of 22,700km is located in the Northern Rivers region of New South Wales (DEC 2005.2, Northern Rivers CMA Website). Draining east from the Great Dividing Range to the river entrance adjacent to the townships of Yamba and Iluka, the catchment extends from the New South Wales/Queensland border and Richmond Range in the north to the Doughboy Range/Dorrigo Plateau in the south. The catchment is characterised by upper tableland areas which fall away to a relatively large, flat coastal floodplain. Grafton and South Grafton are located within the upper reaches of the floodplain.

The Grafton and South Grafton area has a history of both droughts and floods. Since 1839 the Clarence River has experienced 74 moderate to major floods (shown in Graph 1), the most recent flood events being in 2001, 2009 and 2011, when the river reached levels of 7.70mAHD, 7.37mAHD and 7.64mAHD respectively at the Prince Street gauge in North Grafton.

Flooding of the Clarence Valley coastal floodplain typically occurs from low intensity rainfall events that last several days or even weeks. Seasonally, flooding within coastal floodplain predominantly occurs in both late summer and early winter months. This seasonal distribution reflects the fact that the Clarence Valley is predominantly affected by tropical cyclones and winter depressions (PWD, 1980).

The current flood behaviour in Grafton and South Grafton is dominated by a series of levees alongside the Clarence River. Following a number of major floods in the 1940s and 1950s, the significant economic effects of flooding aroused public interest in structural measures aimed at reducing flood risk within the Clarence Valley floodplain. Responsible for the floodplain management, the Clarence River County Council (now the Clarence Valley Council) was formed in 1959. As a measure to increase the level of flood protection to Grafton and South Grafton, construction of numerous linked levees was completed in the 1970's, along both banks of the Clarence River. Since the 1970's additional upgrades to the levees adjacent to South Grafton were completed in 1997, further increasing the flood protection for South Grafton. Since the subsequent upgrade, overtopping of the Grafton urban levees has not occurred.

4.1.4 Land-use

The region has undergone extensive modification from the beginning of non-Aboriginal settlement in the 1830s when clearing of vegetation was rapidly undertaken. This was followed by pastoral land activity and the steady growth of the urban environment. The area is alluvial flood plain.

Grafton, north of the Clarence River, is comprised of predominantly urban streets, housing and some parkland. To the south on the west side of the existing bridge is also the developed urban area of South Grafton. To the east of the bridge is predominantly farming land with associated houses and roads. Whilst subsequent land use would have impacted and modified evidence of previous uses, archaeological sites derived from the building techniques after non-Aboriginal settlement can often survive archaeologically intact and *in-situ*.

4.1.5 Historical Development of Grafton - Timeline

The historical investigation in this report focused on published secondary sources. Key sources for this history are *Grafton: Jacaranda City on the Clarence: A History* by Terry Kass (2009) and *A Thematic History of the City of Grafton* by Brett Stubbs (2007) which forms Volume 2 of the *Grafton City (former) Community Based Heritage Study.* Assessments for previous studies into an additional crossing have also provided historical summaries including Biosis Research (2003) *A Non-Indigenous Heritage Assessment for Route Selection: Proposed Additional Crossing of the Clarence River, Grafton*, and RTA Environmental Technology (2005) *Proposed Duplication of the Clarence River Bridge, Grafton.* The latter report focuses specifically on the historical development of the existing bridge rather than the more general history of Grafton.

Additional research was conducted for this report utilising the resources of the State Library of NSW and the Clarence River Historical Society at Grafton (Schaeffer House). Research at the latter focussed on historical plans and photographs.

The timeline below summarises the historical development of Grafton and South Grafton, focussing on key events and providing an indication of the physical evidence of the event. Evidence includes standing buildings, works, plantings as well as known or potential archaeological evidence.















5.0 EXISTING ENVIRONMENT AND CONSTRAINTS

5.1 Summary of the Investigation

The results of this investigation are derived from a desk top study of heritage items, research at the Grafton Historical Society and two site visits.

Over 500 items are listed on current statutory registers, most of those on the recently gazetted Schedule 1 of the *Grafton Local Environmental Plan 1988*. Over 100 heritage items are listed on more than one register, including the National Trust. There are approximately 6 identified archaeological sites (four that are listed on registers and two sites are visible in the landscape but are not recorded on previous documents) and 7 potential archaeological sites (that is, sites that have been identified through documentary research but are not visible on the ground). Furthermore, four items, all residential buildings, considered to be contributory were identified during the site visits. The blaze tree and adjacent stock yard (identified as an archaeological site) in South Grafton were noted during one of the site visits; these items are shown in Figure 14.

"Schedule 5 Environmental Heritage" of the Clarence Valley Draft Local Environmental Plan 2010 is a combination of the pre-June Heritage Schedule of the Grafton Local Environmental Plan 1988 and the North Coast Regional Environmental Plan (currently in force). If the heritage items listed on the heritage schedule of the regional environmental plan are eventually transferred to the local environmental plan heritage schedule, items of "regional" significance will automatically be reallocated to "local" significance (unless they are already on the State Heritage Register).

The November Ordinary Meeting of the Clarence Valley Council resolved to adopt all but 18 of the potential heritage items identified in the *Community Based Heritage Study* and exclude 1 property from the (then) proposed Grafton Conservation Area (Clarence Valley Council Minutes November 2010: 77). Out of 126 submissions in response to the *Community Based Heritage Study*, 76 were objections, which are currently being assessed on a case-by-case basis (*pers. Comm* Deborah Wray, Clarence Valley Council 12 May 2011). Council's summary of the *Community Based Heritage Study* was to confirm the importance of heritage in Grafton:

Heritage is a major part of Grafton's identity; it attracts tourism, assists in economic development, and is a drawcard to current and prospective residents. Council's 2020 Vision identifies the conservation of cultural heritage as an important part of its Sustainability Strategy.

5.2 Implications of heritage status

5.2.1 Introduction

Grafton and South Grafton are towns with high cultural heritage values. Combined, that value is even greater and is reflected in the identification of its listed heritage items, the large number of potential heritage items recently identified in the *Community Based Heritage Study* (Gardiner 2010) and the existence of the Grafton Conservation Area. One recommendation of the *Community Based Heritage Study* (Gardiner 2010) is for the existing conservation area to be divided into two and extended on both sides of the Clarence River.

Changes to the character of Grafton and South Grafton must be carefully managed to ensure that excessive impacts are not incurred. Detailed assessment of the future impact associated with the duplication of the bridge would be required in order to understand significance, impacts and therefore appropriate management of affected heritage values.

Heritage listings provide identified items with protection under the relevant Act that creates the heritage register. While every effort is made to adequately assess significance during heritage studies, the inclusion of an item on a specific statutory register identifies the Act under which it is protected and is not necessarily an indication of its level of significance; hence the requirement to prepare assessments of heritage significance when changes are proposed to items that are not included in current management documents.

5.2.2 Statutory Protection

STATE HERITAGE REGISTER

Part 5, *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979*, approvals under the *Heritage Act 1977* would be required to make material changes to an item, and its curtilage, that is listed on the SHR.

Part 3A, Environmental *Planning and Assessment Act 1979*, project approval would apply and thus nullify the necessity for permit applications under the *Heritage Act 1977*; however a high standard of reporting would be required to inform the location of an additional crossing and route design and the mitigation strategies would need to respond at a level commensurate with the level of heritage significance. Section 146 of the *Heritage Act 1977* (notification to the Heritage Council in the event that unexpected relics are uncovered) would apply.

LOCAL ENVIRONMENTAL PLAN

Part 5, Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979, would allow the project to proceed under the State Environmental Planning Policy (Infrastructure) 2007. Management of items listed on the heritage schedule of the existing local environmental plan would be assessed with appropriate mitigation approved by the RTA rather than Council. Clarence Valley Council would be notified by the RTA and given the opportunity to respond.

Archaeological sites may also be identified on the heritage schedule of a local environmental plan; however, regardless of their status on a heritage schedule, they require approval under s140 or endorsement under s139 of the *Heritage Act 1977* when being assessed under the *State Environmental Planning Policy (Infrastructure) 2007*. If an archaeological site is recorded on the State Heritage Register, approval would be under s60 or an exemption notification.

Until June 2011 the Grafton Heritage Conservation Area applied to the areas of Grafton and South Grafton in the vicinity of the Clarence River and on the western side of the existing bridge. The *Community Based Heritage Study* (Gardiner 2010) proposed that the existing curtilage of the heritage conservation area be extended and, like the *Draft Clarence River Local Environmental Plan 2010*, divided into two separate areas (Grafton and South Grafton). Many of the proposed items in the towns fell within the expanded conservation area boundaries proposed in the Heritage Study particularly on the north side of the railway line through Grafton. The majority of recommendations made in the *Community Based Heritage Study* were adopted by Council in November 2010 and gazetted on 10 June 2011.

The significance and character of a heritage conservation area lies in the collective contribution made by individual elements, such as buildings, streetscapes, trees etc. Potentially all or none of these individual elements could in turn be listed individually as heritage items. The important elements within the existing and proposed conservation areas are the 19th century street layout evident in Grafton and South Grafton, street plantings and the built environment (including individual buildings, works and monuments). The ability to demonstrate the phases of the towns' development in its architectural manifestations is another value that is collectively embodied in Grafton and South Grafton. The loss of any of these elements diminishes the significance of the Conservation Areas, thus changes should be carefully managed where they are unavoidable.

REGIONAL ENVIRONMENTAL PLAN

Regional environmental plans are environmental planning instruments that address issues that are of regional significance. The Department of Planning is currently in the process of abolishing regional environmental plans (and their schedules) and transferring the controls and schedules to local environmental plans or state environmental planning policies. The heritage schedules of the *North Coast Regional Environmental Plan* and the heritage schedule of the *Grafton Local Environmental Plan* will be consolidated into one instrument when the *Draft Clarence Valley Local Environmental Plan 2010* is adopted. The *North Coast Regional Environmental Plan* is currently in force.

REGISTER OF THE NATIONAL ESTATE

The Register of the National Estate will be phased out by 2012 and it is intended that items listed on the Register will be transferred to other registers. Only items that are owned by the Commonwealth Government are protected by legislation; all other items on the Register are not, but their inclusion is a strong indication of their significance to the community.

PROPOSED ITEMS

Whilst most of the items proposed for listing in the *Community Based Heritage Study* were gazetted in June 2011 as heritage items under the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979*, a small number were excluded due to owner objections. It is possible that the proposed heritage items that were not gazetted will be added to the current heritage schedule of *Grafton Local Environmental Plan 1988* or the *Draft Clarence Valley Local Environmental Plan 2010*. The items in the *Community Based Heritage Study* have been proposed for heritage listing as they have been identified as possessing cultural heritage values; these values should therefore be considered in an assessment of the environmental impact of proposed development. Consultation with Clarence Valley Council will be required prior to the next phase of investigation to confirm the status of the items.

5.2.3 Non-Statutory Listings

NATIONAL TRUST

Whilst the National Trust does not have statutory powers and approval for change is not necessary from the Trust, classification does imply a high level of community esteem. Despite the lack of statutory protection for items that are listed only with the National Trust, demolition or adverse change would require strong justification to the community.

REGISTER OF THE NATIONAL ESTATE

As above (Section 5.2.2).

CONTRIBUTORY

Items identified as "contributory" in this report are those that are considered by Biosis Research to possess heritage value as buildings which contribute to the significance and character of the existing and proposed heritage conservation areas but which are not already listed.

5.3 Implications for known and potential archaeological sites

5.3.1 Terrestrial & Maritime Archaeology

In NSW, relics that are not listed on the State Heritage Register are protected under s139 of the *Heritage Act 1977*. Where archaeological sites or potential archaeological sites have been identified by the current investigation, their status as relics has not been confirmed. Archaeological assessment would be required to establish if those sites are, or contain, relics as this determination is based upon the assessed significance of non-Aboriginal sites. Furthermore, the sites that have been identified as potential archaeological sites have been identified through an inspection of historical plans and maps rather than through visual inspection.

All archaeological sites that prove to contain (or be) relics are protected under the *Heritage Act 1977*. They cannot be disturbed or destroyed except with approval from the Heritage Council of NSW if the project has been approved under Part 5 of the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979*. Project approval under Part 3A of the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979* removes the permit approval process under the *Heritage Act 1977*, but does not remove the obligation to undertake the assessment and further work to "best practice" standards.

5.4 Constraints

5.4.1 Non-Aboriginal cultural landscape

At the level of investigation undertaken for this stage of the proposal, a basic classification of Grafton and South Grafton can be made with regard paid to the non-Aboriginal cultural landscape. The method of classification employed in this investigation uses the concentration of heritage items listed on statutory registers; the level of registered significance; archaeological sensitivity (this grouping includes known and potential archaeological sites); and proximity to the Clarence River and therefore the level of impact should a crossing be proposed in proximity.

Schedule 1 of the *Grafton Local Environmental Plan 1988* lists nine individual items as possessing "state" significance, while the State Heritage Register lists seven; 4 in Grafton and 3 in South Grafton. The two additional items are the Victorian Cottage and the Georgian Cottage at Duke Street Grafton (part of the Cathedral group and listed on Fitzroy Street Grafton) and are included in the SHR listing, thus are not in fact "additional" to the State Heritage Register; Council has listed them separately.

1. Grafton

The expansion of the conservation area in Grafton and the addition of a large number of heritage items to the heritage schedule of the *Grafton Local Environmental Plan 1988* have resulted in an area with a substantial level of heritage constraints on the north side of the Clarence River. With the exception of the Rail and Road Bridge, all four SHR listed items in Grafton occur on the upstream side of the bridge (west), although one of those items, the Grafton Correctional Facility (or gaol) is at a considerable distance to the river. Heritage items listed on the North Coast REP heritage schedules are spread evenly across the most concentrated area of Grafton close to the river. All the heritage items listed on s.170 registers are situated on the western side of the bridge with the RTA Regional Office located at 31 Victoria Street Grafton adjacent to the river bank.

The original conservation area has been divided into two separate entities with the area in Grafton being expanded considerably (refer Figure 5).

One item, "Dovedale" listed on the heritage schedule of the *North Coast Regional Environmental Plan* is located downstream of the bridge and adjacent to the river bank on Breimba Street, Grafton. Of note in this area, is the avenue of trees on Breimba Street which is listed as a potential heritage item on *The Community Based Heritage Study* and is worthy of mention in this section.

In addition to items listed on the statutory registers, one archaeological site was identified through an analysis of plans and another was identified on the *Grafton Local Environmental Plan* and the Register of the National Estate. The first is on the grounds of the TAFE property, which is identified as "Dunvegan", a free-standing, two-story Victorian dwelling. The 1914 Sewerage Plan for Grafton (Plate 5) shows now-demolished buildings surrounding "Dunvegan". The second archaeological site in Grafton is the site of the former Grafton Courthouse, part of the Grafton Civic Group, which is listed on the *Grafton Local Environmental Plan 1988*. The Grafton Punt is listed on the Australian National Shipwrecks Database but its location is unknown.

Certain street trees are also protected by their inclusion on Schedule 1 of the Grafton LEP. The location of most of the trees is not given; instead the listing extends to all *Brachychiton* (flame trees), *Ficus* (fig trees) or Jacaranda trees over 3 metres in height. Of note are the plantings of figs on Breimba Street and the memorial plantings on Bacon Street (between Queen Street and Cranworth Street). Other significant groups of memorial trees are located in Pound Street, Clarence Street and Queen Street. Pound Street is known as Jacaranda Avenue marking the location of the original Jacaranda Festival, and the SHR listed Cathedral precinct and Victoria Street group is marked by mature trees (Gardiner 2010: 21 – 22). In general, flame trees, fig trees and jacarandas over 3 metres in height that are located within a road reserve are protected by their status on the heritage schedule of the *Grafton Local Environmental Plan 1988*.

2. South Grafton

A large number of heritage items are concentrated around the South Grafton CBD clustered around Skinner Street and within the expanded conservation area.

The Railway Station Group is located to the east of the Bent Street alignment and south of the existing bridge and is on the State Heritage Register, Schedule 1 of the *Grafton LEP 1988* as well as the Railcorp s.170 Register (including the railway turntable). The South Grafton Fire Station is also listed on the NSW Fire Brigade s.170 Register.

One item, the hull of the SS Induna (and Bow Memorial) is listed on the North Coast Regional Environmental Plan as well as on the Australian National Shipwrecks Database and it is a recent addition to the Grafton LEP 1988 heritage schedule. It is located on the banks of the Clarence, approximately 189 metres from the existing bridge. The Induna is also considered a "relic" (archaeological site protected under the Heritage Act). The site of a building belonging to the former surveyors Wilson (2 brothers) is located at the base of the southern bridge abutments on the upstream side and possesses potential as an archaeological site (refer Plate 3).

A number of archaeological sites have been identified at this preliminary stage of the investigation. Identification was made through analysis of early plans and during the site visits conducted by Biosis Research in 2010. The southern bank is particularly rich with archaeological sites and potential archaeological sites. In the vicinity of the bridge abutments there are visible relics related to two of the former rail wharfs, the railway terminus and the entrance to the rail ferry wharf as well as the railway turntable and the site of a stock reserve (refer Figure 5).

Trees that were identified as significant in South Grafton include the camphor laurels and pine trees along Skinner Street. These trees are described as providing an entrance to the South Grafton commercial area (Gardiner 2010: 22). Flame trees, fig trees and jacarandas over 3 metres in height that are located within a road reserve are protected by their status on the heritage schedule of the *Grafton Local Environmental Plan 1988*.

6.0 PRELIMINARY CONCLUSIONS & RECOMMENDATIONS

Preliminary Conclusions

Overall, Grafton and South Grafton have a large number of heritage items in the form of domestic, government/civic and commercial buildings, terrestrial and maritime archaeological sites as well as cultural plantings. At the November 2010 Ordinary Meeting (Clarence Valley Council, held 16 November), Council acknowledged the importance of the heritage character of Grafton and South Grafton to the area's identity. Council's 2020 vision considers Grafton and South Grafton's cultural heritage an important part of its Sustainability Strategy (Clarence Valley Council). This is a view that appears to be supported by the majority of the community that responded to the findings of the *Community Based Heritage Study*.

This examination considered items with current statutory protection, which now include the majority of items identified as "proposed" by the *Community Based Heritage Study*. One issue that was identified by Council in the November Ordinary meeting is that some of the addresses of recently gazetted heritage items are incorrect; it is not known if this issue has been rectified. Whilst this does not apply to many items, addresses should be verified when the proposal progresses. The exclusion of some items and consideration of the 50 objections has not impacted the overall heritage significance of Grafton and South Grafton.

The pattern that is evident at this broad scale is that the majority of heritage items, including those on the State Heritage Register, occur in Grafton and South Grafton on the upstream side of the bridge. The layout of the street grid is evidence of the planning that went into Grafton and South Grafton and is an historic reminder of their development.

Archaeological sites have been identified as confirmed or potential and are not confined to one area of Grafton and South Grafton; they are scattered across the immediate area. Other archaeological sites that have not been identified may also exist; however, further research would be required to identify them.

Downstream of the bridge in South Grafton, the non-Aboriginal cultural landscape has fewer built items but a small number of archaeological sites. Farmland to the east of the existing bridge does not have confirmed heritage items although some areas have pockets of archaeological sites or may have isolated significant structures. A tree with a surveyor's blaze and a former stock reserve are located in this area, as are a number of archaeological sites (potentially relics) associated with ferry crossings that became redundant with the opening of the bridge.

Grafton and South Grafton contain items which demonstrate their post-contact settlement and growth. Historical heritage values are represented by a combination of architectural, archaeological and landscape items that, as a whole, demonstrate the development of the area since European settlement and contribute significantly to its character; a point that is also reflected by the creation of the conservation areas. The result is that a number of issues are raised by large-scale development and the management of the area's heritage assets.

In order to understand the level of impact that is likely to be incurred by the construction of an additional crossing of the Clarence River, a basic examination of the relative level of significance is necessary. One issue that became apparent during the preparation of this report is that although the items on the *Grafton LEP 1988* and the *Clarence Valley Draft LEP 2010* (which includes the *North Coast REP*) are, by default, items of 'local' significance unless they are identified on the State Heritage Register, there is considerable variation between them in terms of relative significance.

Recommendations

The assessment process for this report, which was through documentary research and visual inspection of parts of Grafton and South Grafton, confirmed that there is variation in the local significance category. It is clear that some of the heritage items have undergone modifications that are likely to have diminished their value as an individual item, without those modifications diminishing their contribution to the conservation area.

Consequently in assessing the impact of an additional crossing at Grafton, on historical cultural heritage, the relative significance of the item or group should be considered.

Grafton and South Grafton are distinctive for the heritage character that they retain; this is reflected in the creation of the Conservation Area and the proposed residential groups. Consideration should be given to adapting the design of the additional crossing to the significance of the whole, as identified by the Conservation Area.

The following recommendations with regard to non-Aboriginal heritage have been provided with to guide the next step in the process.

1. Conservation through avoidance

- 1.1 The preferred outcome is that impacts to heritage items are avoided. Heritage items are considered as: listed items, contributory items and archaeological sites.
- 1.2 Where total avoidance is not possible, preference for the location of an additional crossing should be given to areas where the relative impacts to heritage are at a minimum.
- 1.3 The identification of the preferred location of an additional crossing will require detailed historical assessment and identification of impacts to assist in understanding the cumulative impact of the proposed bridge construction as well as the management issues that may arise from those impacts (refer Recommendation 2.1).

2.0 Understanding the heritage significance of the place

2.1 Undertake further investigation that assesses potential crossing locations in terms of impacts on heritage significance at the short-listed stage of options. The assessment should consider a number of factors and be undertaken in consultation with the Heritage Branch (Office of Environment and Heritage) and the RTA. It is important to note that considerable variation exists within the items that have been assessed as possessing local significance and addressing that variation will assist with the decision making process where it is informed by heritage issues.

3.0 Further archaeological assessment

3.1 Undertake detailed assessment of heritage items and archaeological sites when a preferred location for an additional crossing is identified.

4.0 Consultation with Clarence Valley Council

4.1 A total of 76 objections were received in response to the public exhibition of the proposed heritage items. These items have been removed from the in-force heritage schedule but may be added at a later date. When assessing preferred locations for the addition crossing, consult with Clarence Valley Council to ensure that the status of potential heritage items has not changed to gazetted.

4. Proposed Additions to the Grafton Heritage Schedule

4.1 Individual Heritage Items

This Community Based Heritage Study, after assessing over 840 items, considers that 289 individual items, 64 groups of items and two conservation areas are of significance in the former Grafton City LGA and strongly recommends they should be included on the Clarence Valley Local Environment Plan. By comparison the recently gazetted Heritage Schedule for the Maclean LEP 2007 now has 257 individually listed items and six conservation areas.

Many of the items identified and assessed were not newly discovered historic items. They have been described and reported in earlier heritage studies undertaken by Council, the National Trust and private individuals. Items have been recommended because they have again been identified as historically significant, or as having a high level of integrity or originality, or are a good example of an historic theme, or are particularly rare or representative of their type.

Recent changes to state planning laws have now directed Councils to reassess regionally significant heritage items listed on the North Coast REP and determine if they are significant to the State. They are automatically significant to the local area and have been incorporated into Clarence Valley's LEP.

4.2 Groups of Heritage Items

This Study recommends the following 64 groups for inclusion on the heritage schedule of places of local significance in the Clarence Valley Local Environment Plan. As mentioned in Section 4 these groups of places are considered significant because they contains a high proportion of intact dwellings and provide Grafton with its historic streetscapes. These dwellings may be of similar ages or present a mixture of ages and dwelling styles. Block size, relationship to the street (setback), location of garages and driveways, bulk and scale, gardens and street plantings, grass verges, and fences all contribute to the resulting historic streetscape(s). It is their collective value that makes the retention of these groups so important.

4.3 Conservation Areas

This Study recommends that two conservation areas, namely the Grafton and South Grafton Urban Conservation Areas, be included in the Heritage Schedule of the Clarence Valley LEP. The boundaries of these areas are defined in Figure 4.4 and Figure 4.7. The current North Coast Regional Environmental Plan (1988) has already acknowledged the significance of these areas but has listed Grafton and South Grafton as one conservation area. This has caused confusion. Due to their individual local heritage significance, some places and groups contained within these conservation areas are also listed separately as individual heritage items.

It should be noted that the Draft Clarence Valley LEP 2008 has automatically listed this regionally significant area on Council's new planning document. The boundaries of this area are identified in Figure 4.1. This study strongly recommends that the boundaries identified in the North Coast REP (1988) be expanded to more accurately reflect the exceptional collection of intact and noteworthy domestic, commercial, civic and ecclesiastical buildings and settings found in the former Grafton City LGA.

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


Figure 1.1 Grafton City Local Government Area (former)
